2023 Annual Breakfast: An Inspiring and Discerning Perspective on the Consequences of New Hampshire's Housing Situation

houghtful and thought-provoking perspective on the housing crisis were a palpable component of this year's Annual Breakfast event in March where we also recognized support and involvement, as well as determination and resolve, in NeighborWorks[®] Southern New Hampshire's ongoing commitment to addressing one of the most consequential issues facing our state.

Max Latona, Executive Director of the Center for Ethics in Society at Saint Anselm College, delivered a keynote address that exhorted guests to think more profoundly about the implications and consequences of zoning barriers that restrict development of housing in New Hampshire communities, and ultimately create the detrimental consequence of "human suffering" for those struggling to afford a place to live in our state. Latona stated that the affordable housing problem "is not just a

lamentable unfortunate state of affairs, but is rather a moral wrong, an injustice that is causing a vast amount of unnecessary suffering." Dr. Latona acknowledged that his perspective does not readily factor into decisions about housing development vis-à-vis concerns often expressed by officials and other citizens about density and taxes but urged guests to consider this consequence when affordable housing is blocked where needed.

Other event highlights included a preview of Housing Fact or Fiction, a documentary series produced by Jay Childs of JBC Communications, and recognition of Thomas Breslawski and Beth Jellison whose terms on our Board of Directors expired in March. Both Tom and Beth have served NeighborWorks[®] Southern New Hampshire admirably and generously.

s NeighborWorks[®] Southern New Hampshire begins a new fiscal year, our Board of Directors has approved a new strategic plan. Although we will continue to carry on our good work over the next few years, the timing is particularly important as we are facing some of the most difficult housing challenges we've ever seen in our region. It's simply not enough to just keep doing things the way we have for the past 30 years.

Creating a place for people to live and thrive in a community is more difficult now than ever. All of the market conditions are working

against us. Interest rates haven't been this high for 20 years, leaving little incentive for 99% of existing homeowners to sell their house. This reality, combined with high construction costs and land use challenges associated with building new homes, makes it nearly impossible for first time buyers to enter the market.

With so few people buying homes, the pressure on the rental market is extreme. Although new apartments are being built, the price point of the rent is beyond reach for anyone earning less than \$120,000. For years, we have stood by the formula that with a reasonably priced piece of land with sufficient density and utilities, we can assemble the resources to build affordable housing. Unfortunately, that recipe doesn't hold true anymore. Now it literally takes a miracle on top of everything else to make it all come together.

With all of these challenges, it was inspiring to have Max Latona provide a thought-provoking perspective about the detrimental cost to the human condition with restrictive attitudes about housing and extreme market conditions at our recent breakfast.

We need to be creative and take on greater levels of risk more than ever before. And we need your help through advocacy and your financial support to make these <u>miracles</u> happen.

Raymond J. Wieczorek December 9, 1928 – November 22, 2022



eighborWorks® Southern New Hampshire lost a long-time friend with the passing of Raymond J. Wiezorek, a public servant for many years, most notably as Mayor of Manchester for five terms, from 1990 to 2000, and as an Executive Councilor for the State of New Hampshire for six terms, from 2002 to 2012.

Our association with Ray goes back to 1992 when he took action as Mayor to

address the disinvestment and blight prevalent in the Center City's housing stock at that time. He learned about Neighborhood Reinvestment Corporation (known today as NeighborWorks® America) and was intrigued by their 85 percent track record in revitalizing neighborhoods. But he was told that the national organization would not come to a community until the community has the full cooperation of major entities-business, political, and financial. Ray worked to unite leaders of these sectors behind his vision for revitalizing the Center City neighborhood, which ultimately led to this organization's founding in Manchester.

Today, NeighborWorks® Southern New Hampshire continues to addresses housing and neighborhood revitalization needs in Manchester, but we have expanded our focus to include Nashua and 29 other communities in southern New Hampshire for this purpose. In addition, our HOMEteam program extends from the southern border of the state to the Lakes Region, helping first-time homebuyers purchase a home they can afford to maintain and sustain.



In 2002, Ray was one of seven people nationally recognized by NeighborWorks® America with its Public Service Award for the significant role he played in garnering the support needed on various levels and helping to bring change in the Center City neighborhood.

In 2012, we recognized Ray with the David P. Goodwin Outstanding Neighbor Award for demonstrating the spirit of this special award, which is how an individual can make a difference.

In 2013, Ray served as Honorary Chairman of our 25th Anniversary Capital Campaign, helping us raise funds for the redevelopment of 801 Elm Street in downtown Manchester, which serves as our administrative offices, as well as meeting

space for our homeownership and financial wellness educational seminars and counseling services. We encourage you to view our 25th anniversary video on the home page of our website (www.nwsnh.org), which features comments from Ray.

We were humbled to learn that in his final days Ray expressed that he considers NeighborWorks® Southern New Hampshire to be one of his proudest accomplishments. Ray cared about creating quality housing and understood its positive impact on lives, neighborhoods, and communities. We appreciate all he did in helping us launch the organization, and we will continue our important mission to help New Hampshire residents.

HomeOwnership: The Impact of Recent Market **Changes on our Clients** HOMEteam

t has been said that homeownership is the fastest way to build intergenerational wealth; however, saying it's been a difficult year for our clients trying to purchase their first family home would be a tremendous understatement. The extremely low mortgage rates made for a very competitive market. Many sellers were not willing to accept offers that came from buyers with government financing, i.e., FHA and USDA, and with home inspection requirements. Most homes were selling for well above asking price and many to cash or conventional loan buyers with little to no conditions.

Although not ideal for most future homebuyers, the current market conditions, including rising interest rates, have inspired many future homebuyers to spend the time necessary to become knowledgeable about the entire homebuying process and seek out pre-purchase education and counseling.
