Finding a Place of Comfort at Silver Mill Apartments

olores and Domingo Soto, brother and sister, came to the United States in 1998 from Saint Croix, the U.S. Virgin Islands, to be near Dolores' daughter who lived in New Hampshire. Assimilating quickly to life in Manchester, Dolores worked on the custodial staff in the Manchester Public Schools while supplementing her income working as a seamstress to support herself and Domingo. Dolores is 79 years old, and Domingo is 87 years old.

Life took a turn for the worse, however, in 2009 when Dolores was laid off from her primary job and Domingo's health began to falter. As a result, living in her daughter's two-story house became increasingly difficult because Domingo's condition necessitated use of a wheelchair and he could not maneuver between the two floors.

"It was a really dark time in our lives," says Dolores. "I knew we needed to relocate to a living environment that offered more accessibility for my brother, but cost was an issue because I did not

have steady employment and am now in my senior years as well," she continues.

Searching for weeks and finding apartments that were either unaffordable or lacked handicapped accessibility, Dolores learned about NeighborWorks® Southern New Hampshire's rental properties after being introduced to Lissette Feliciano who works for Stewart Property Management. "The rest fell into place," says Dolores.

The Sotos submitted an application for a rental unit, and a suitable first floor unit at Silver Mill Apartments became available after a few weeks. In addition, Lissette provided information about resources available that would help them live independently.

"We've never been happier," says Dolores. "I've made so many friends with nearly everyone in the building, even the children come up and say hello."

Dolores did not expect this change of course in her or her brother's lives, as she now cares for him on a daily basis. Yet she recognizes that their quality of life and overall health have improved because they live in a positive living environment that they can afford. Despite Domingo's health challenges, they enjoy attending a senior center where they partake in positive activities, such as painting, dominoes, and bingo. Dolores also enjoys being able to volunteer her skills to teach others how to sew. page 1

NeighborWorks® Southern New Hampshire Participating in Manchester's Community Schools Project

eighborWorks[®] Southern New Hampshire is participating in the Community Schools Project, a collaborative, multi-year effort rolled out by the City of Manchester's Health Department as part of its Neighborhood Health Improvement Strategy. Funded through Granite United Way, the Community School's Project focuses on neighborhoods of greatest risk in Manchester, utilizing elementary schools in these areas as points of location for the delivery of resources and supports for residents.

From October through May, NeighborWorks[®] Southern New Hampshire will provide free financial literacy workshops at Gossler Park and Beech Street Schools. Each one-hour session will address specific financial and money-management topics, such as creating a spending and savings plan, establishing financial goals, building and improving credit, and protecting and enhancing income. Additional services to be provided include free tax preparation for qualified families and one-on-one financial coaching.

NeighborWorks[®] Southern New Hampshire will also deliver resident leadership training workshops at both Gossler Park and Beech Street Schools over the next six months. These leadership workshops will educate residents about effective strategies and tools for positive involvement in their neighborhood. Our goal is to facilitate leadership development leading to the creation of neighborhood watch groups, beautification projects, and graffiti prevention programs, creating a neighborhood of pride rather than a neighborhood of last resort.

In recognition of its innovative approach to addressing a multitude of issues in its neediest residents, the City of Manchester was one of seven recipients in the country to be awarded a Culture of Health prize by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. NeighborWorks[®] Southern New Hampshire is pleased to be part of this effort.

Community Impact Measurement Surveys Conducted in Nashua

n August, nearly thirty volunteers and staff spent a Saturday afternoon in Nashua, asking residents of the Tree Streets neighborhood to complete a survey as part of our participation in NeighborWorks® America's Community Impact Measurement initiative. Residents were asked to fill out a survey that allows them to reflect on common issues that affect quality of life in the neighborhood, commenting on their perceptions of neighborhood living conditions, services, and related matters. A total of 200 surveys were collected in this process, which also provided an opportunity for residents to come together to enjoy an afternoon of music, games, and ice cream.
